Building Transformation What's Under the Parking Lot



The City of Westerville requires that new parking lots have a water retention and release system underneath the surface. These yellow half-domes were installed under our new parking lot in November. Though you can't see them now, they are helping to retain rain water runoff and release it slowly into the city storm sewer system. This helps to prevent flooding in our city. Soon the new parking lot will get its base coat. The final coat of asphalt for our new parking lot will have to wait until the temperatures warm up this spring.

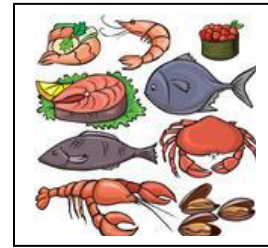
Our next meeting: Monday, January 15, 1:00 – 2:30, at the church.

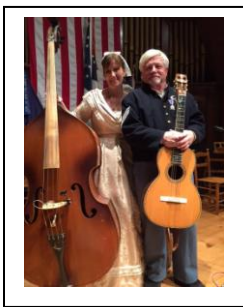

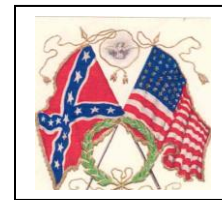

Musician Performer & Historian

A special program & dinner are being planned for this date with musician performer and historian Steve Ball. His program will connect with Ohio, as well as Westerville's history, including the music of Benjamin Hanby.

Steve Ball is from Columbus and specializes in the music of the American Civil War and the music and life of Stephen Foster. Steve has studied the Civil War since his teens and has devoted the past twenty years to studying the music of this era. He has also performed for many years for a variety of groups all around the United States. He has several programs that he presents, but ours will focus on the Civil War, tying it in with our Westerville history.

The Civil War presentation begins with tunes from the mid 1850's that reflect the climate of the country before the war began in 1861. As the presentation unfolds, Steve will offer patriotic songs cherished by both sides, a sing-along, and finally tunes that reflect the loss and melancholy the war produced. The history and influence of each tune is shared, as well as the progress of the war itself.

Several members of our congregation have seen Steve's performances, along with his wife Lisa's vocal harmonies and her accompaniment on the string bass. Our audience is sure to be moved and entertained by their performance.

Pike County: 40 Years of Outreach!

The Pike County Outreach Food Pantry, the only pantry in that county, is open every day of the year except December 25. On each of those days, 50 to 70 people arrive, hoping to get enough food to sustain their families for a few more days. They patiently sit in a waiting room, as one person at a time visits the pantry to choose one breakfast item, two cans of vegetables, a loaf of bread, a meat item, and so on. During the summer, local farmers bring in fresh vegetables, a treat for families in need. Pantry staff help the families make selections and keep a record of what each person takes. Every seven days, families can return for more food.

You know that our church also donates hats, gloves, socks, and other warm clothing in the late fall. These items and other donations, such as paperback books, are offered to families when they are available.

Sharon and John Davis have been helping with the Pike County Pantry for as long as they can remember. They are sure that the church has been supporting the pantry for at least 40 years. The Davises make the 90-minute trip to Pike County about every other week, year round, carting down boxes and bags of food donated by our members. “A full car makes us smile,” Sharon says. You might recall that recently, she asked the congregation for cereal. You responded! One Thursday, the Davises took down 161 boxes of cereal! Sharon remembers that the pantry staff gasped when they saw the stacks and stacks of cereal. However, by Saturday, all of the cereal was gone, brightening the mornings for hungry families in Pike County.

John Davis grew up in Adams County, next door to Pike, so he has seen firsthand the need for help in this part of our state. In recent years, this need has increased drastically, often resulting in empty pantry shelves. The pantry gets some help from a food bank in Cincinnati. Local grocery stores also donate food nearing its expiration date.

Often other church members make the trip to Pike County with Sharon and John, including Denny and Sue Ann Norton, Mary Lee Jones, Bonnie Moses, and others. Lately, these church members have been driving down one day a week to help check people in, stock shelves, and do whatever else is needed. Sharon says they will not be traveling to Pike County during the winter because of the weather, but they will return one day a week in the spring—and she welcomes more volunteers who are willing to make the trip one or many times!

Sharon says, “We take food down to Pike County because it needs to be done, but it’s heart-warming to donate time for someone who really, really needs it.”

Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

About this time last year, there was a story on NPR and thanks to the Internet, I was able to find it in the NPR archives (Jan. 15, 2017) The story is about the Coventry Cathedral in England. In 1940 during the Blitz, it was nearly bombed to destruction. The ruins of the medieval tower and the outer wall have been kept as a space for remembrance, and the only thing added was an inscription on the wall behind the altar that says simply, “Father, forgive.” The congregation built the new cathedral next to the remains of the old. But now, many decades later, in the middle of a world that seems primarily bound together only by fear and by disdain of others, Coventry Cathedral has erected another sign, this one on the front door of the church. The sign says this:

We extend a special welcome to those who are single, married, divorced, widowed, straight, gay, confused, well-heeled, or down-at-the-heel. We welcome wailing babies and excited toddlers. We welcome you whether you can sing like Pavarotti or just growl quietly to yourself. You are welcome here if you are just browsing, you just woke up, or just got out of prison. No matter what color you are, you are welcome here. We don't care if you are more Christian than the Archbishop of Canterbury or haven't been to church since Christmas ten years ago. We extend a special welcome to those who are over sixty but still not grown up yet and to teenagers who are growing up too fast. We welcome keep-fit moms, football dads, starving artists, tree huggers, latte sippers, vegetarians, junk-food eaters. We welcome those who are in recovery or still addicted. We welcome you if you're having problems, are down in the dumps, or don't like organized religion. We're not keen on it either. We offer welcome to those who work too hard, don't work, can't spell, or are here because Granny is visiting and wanted to come to the cathedral. We offer a special welcome to those who could use a prayer right now, had religion shoved down their throats as kids, or just got lost and wound up here by mistake. We welcome pilgrims, tourists, seekers, doubters, and you.

When asked about the sign, the current rector said in the interview, “It's simply about being a place where people can leave their differences at the door and come into conversation with one another and with God.”

I wonder if the Coventry Cathedral congregation isn't on to something...that in a world where we talk at each other rather than to each other, the church can be a place where we can learn to be together no matter what our differences are. For what is a church other than a gathering of those who are seeking Christ in one way or another? Within the church, so many times we focus on our differences—theological differences, worship differences, sacramental differences, structural differences—that we often forget what we have in common. So often we worry so much about being right that we forget to be loving. Coventry has a history that shows just how destructive we can be when we let our differences come between us. As we enter this New Year, I hope that we can find ways to welcome all to our fellowship, and together we might find new and fruitful ways to understand and follow Christ.
