CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

We had some GOOD NEWS on construction/renovation project this week = the elevator passed its final inspection with the State of Ohio and will be available for use on Sunday, June 24!

The project still has not passed the City's final occupancy inspection, but we're down to only 2 minor items remaining:

- 1. We're awaiting the installation of a "duct heater" in the "make-up air duct" for the boiler room. The duct heater won't actually be needed until heating season next fall, but the City insists that it be installed now.
 - Duct heater is shipping this week and will be installed next week.
- 2. Handicapped parking signs actual signs / not just pavement markings
 - A contractor friend of mine donated 2 handicapped parking signs, and Mike Etling installed them on Saturday. One issue down.

The City was willing to issue a temporary occupancy permit, BUT it would cost the Church an additional \$200 non-refundable fee, and we would need to post a \$1,000 bond with the City -- refundable once the heater was installed. After conferring, Mark and Mike decided we should save the \$200 and just wait for the heater to be installed.

AND >>> the City inspector said we could start "occupying" the space.

So, the elevator will be in service on June 24, Mark's allowed to move into his new office, Heather and Linda can move into their new digs, and we can finally use the Blue Room!

New Co-Moderators are elected at the 223rd General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church

The Presbyterian Church (USA) General Assembly took place from June 16-23 in St. Louis, Missouri. The highlight of every GA is the election of a Moderator, or as was the case this year, Co-Moderators. Below is an excerpt from the PC(USA) news service about the two women who were elected as Co-Moderators of our denomination.

It took commissioners four ballots Saturday evening to elect an English as a Second Language (ESL) teacher and a mid-council executive as the Presbyterian Church (USA)'s second-ever co-moderators. Vilmarie Cintrón-Olivieri of the Presbytery of Tropical Florida and the Rev. Cindy Kohlmann of the presbyteries of Boston and Northern New England gained their victory at 9:01 p.m. Central Time. Following their election, the new co-moderators were immediately installed by the co-moderators of the 223nd General Assembly by the Revs. Denise Anderson and Jan Edmiston, as well as the Rev. J. Herbert Nelson, II, stated clerk of the General Assembly. Cintrón-Olivieri's family displayed the Puerto Rican flag as the two new leaders were being installed, honoring the place where she lived until 2011.

Cintrón-Olivieri is an ESL teacher and a ruling elder at First Spanish Presbyterian Church in Miami. Last year she was moderator of the Presbytery of Tropical Florida. She was a Youth Advisory Delegate to the 205th General Assembly in 1993, and was asked at age 19 to serve on the session of Caparra Terrace Presbyterian Church in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Kohlmann has pastored congregations in Ohio and Massachusetts. She's currently resources presbyter for the Presbyteries of Boston and Northern New England. As resource presbyter, she designs leadership training opportunities, connects pastors and congregations with local and denominational resources, and has helped start sometimes difficult conversations about structure and vision in the midst of change.

"We are deeply honored by your confidence," Kohlmann told commissioners following their installation. "We will seek God's will in all we do, praying that the Spirit will blow us to new places – all because of our common love for Christ, who is our lord and savior."

Ministry can look different in some of the small New England towns where Kohlmann serves two presbyteries. One example: Leeds, Maine, a town of about 2,300 people where the town's church and gathering place "took the locks off the door and unlocked the internet." Now the church is full of "unchurched" people – students doing their homework after school and "a gym full of people."

"Sometimes we get tied to our buildings," Cintrón-Olivieri said. "Maybe we need to see what is happening in the community to rethink the structures we have."

"We want to invite the church into deeper faithfulness, including languages and cultures and many identities and orientations, all of which reflect the breadth of God's creation," Kohlmann told commissioners.

"I look different, and sometimes I feel that way too," Cintron-Olivieri said. "But we need to keep showing up, even around people who don't think like we do. We need to concentrate on what we cherish and what we share. If we do that, we can claim to be walking with God."

Compassion and Caring

The Compassionate Friends (TCF) is a self-help group supporting parents, grandparents, and siblings after a child dies. We have the highest dues of any organization – the death of a child. TCF has existed since the mid-1970s with about 800 chapters around the world. The website is CompassionateFriends.org, and many people find it helpful to be involved in the computer chat rooms that are offered. Ages of the children who have died vary from 0 to grown adults. We became involved with the organization when our oldest daughter, Michelle, died in 1996. Meetings in the Columbus area are at Ascension Lutheran Church on Morse Road just west of Karl Road. We meet on the second Tuesday of every month at 7 pm, and we are available for all family survivors of the death of a child.

At a typical meeting, we have 25-40 people (mostly parents), and we start by going around the circle, sharing our name, our child's name and age, the date and cause of death, a short characteristic of the child, and names of surviving siblings. If a person cannot share, he or she is welcome to pass. We usually have 3-8 new people at each meeting. It is very hard for most new attendees. We break into two groups to give everyone more chances to talk (this is what really counts in the healing process). We share questions and ideas that might or might not be related to the night's topic for the evening, such as Anger, Guilt, Triggers, Surviving the First Year, Coping With the Holidays, Joy in Remembering, Effects on Family Relationships, Beyond Surviving, Effects on Job, Stigmatized Deaths (suicide, drug overdose), Music in Grieving, Etc.

The two groups go for about 1.5 hours, and then we stop for a closing circle and refreshments. Then people can bring up things with specific people. Everyone is gone by 10 pm.

Every 2-3 months, TCF meets at a local restaurant for an informal supper, which is open to all members. We have a special candlelight service attended by 70-100 family members in early December to brace ourselves for the holiday season. We have a picnic/flower release at a local park in June. A woman's lunch takes place every fourth Thursday, and a woman's weekend retreat occurs in early October. There is also a national 2-day convention where about 1500 people attend. This year it is in St. Louis in late July.



We communicate in TCF by email and phone. We are available for **ANY** grieving parent or sibling, and we find that the more people attend meetings, the more thoroughly they can work through their grief and move on to more meaningful lives. However, it is hard work, and many people come a few times and then stop. If you know of any grieving family, please tell us so we can invite them to a TCF meeting

Paying for Our Beautiful New Addition and Renovation

The total cost of our project is expected to be \$2,439,116. This entire amount is covered by three sources:

\$837,674 donations made before 2015 earmarked for capital improvement \$1,368,659 Capital Campaign pledges \$232,783 money we "borrowed" from ourselves (from scholarship and Mission funds)

People are being very faithful in completing their Capital Campaign pledges, paying \$1,069,579 as of June 2018. The remaining \$299,080 in pledge payments will be made through January 2020.

We will complete payments to our contractors, architect, and all vendors this summer using donations already received and a "bridge loan" we obtained from the Presbyterian Church. We will finish paying off the bridge loan in January 2020, when final Capital Campaign pledges are received. If pledge payments come in early, we will pay off this loan early and save on interest payments.

The Stewardship and Finance Committee and the Session are working on a plan to pay ourselves back, to restore the funds we borrowed internally.
