Dorothy Driskell to Lead Torch

Dorothy Driskell, a current Deacon and active member of our church, is the president-elect of the International Association of Torch Clubs. So, what is Torch?

The torch is the ancient symbol of light and truth – the light of knowledge which bringeth understanding. The objectives of a Torch Club are to give members of different professions an opportunity to meet in the spirit of fellowship, to prevent the narrowing tendencies of specialization by developing a breath of thought and culture, and to foster the highest standards of professional ethics and civic well-being.



The interaction among the various professions represented in a Torch Club is a stimulating and rewarding experience. The highlight of the usual Torch Club dinner meeting is the presentation of a paper by a member of the club. The topics of these papers are as varied as the professions of the members. Examples include "The Gifted: Resiliency and Brain Plasticity," "A Century of Chemical Warfare," and "China: Off the Beaten Path." Everyone participating in the meeting benefits from the wide variety of thought in the paper presented and from the lively discussion that follows and continues over dinner. It is through this sharing of knowledge and differing points of view that membership in a local Torch Club becomes a challenging experience.

The Torch Club differs from service clubs, fraternities, unions, and other professional clubs in method and purpose. It is non-profit and non-political and sponsors no causes or partisan movements.

The first Torch Club was formed and chartered in Minneapolis, MN, in 1924. Many clubs quickly followed, with the Columbus Club becoming the tenth group in 1926. Today, 70+ clubs thrive across the United States and Canada and form the International Association of Torch Clubs.

Dorothy will serve two years as president-elect of the International Clubs. Then she will be president for two years and past president for another two years. She has belonged to the Columbus Torch Club since 2008, has served as Membership Chair since 2009, and was president from 2012-2013. The Columbus Torch Club meets on the first Thursday of October through May at 5:30 PM at the Ohio State Faculty Club. Any questions? Just ask Dorothy!

What's in Your Future?

Members of our church who are high school seniors or matriculating college students in a bachelor degree, associate degree, or similar level of education: it is time to think about applying for a First Presbyterian Church of Westerville education scholarship. Scholarship applications are available in the Knox Meeting Room. Applications are due on Monday, May 20, and the scholarships will be awarded on Sunday, July 14.

To be considered for a 2019 Scholarship, you must submit all of the following requirements to the Scholarship Committee by Monday, May 20:

- A fully completed application form
- Two letters of recommendation, one academic and one personal/character
- A copy of your recent grade transcript

Please remember that all parts of an application must be received by the church by the due date. Incomplete applications will not be considered for a scholarship. An application for a scholarship may be submitted every year that you are a student, but a maximum of two annual scholarships will be awarded per applicant.

Pastor's Page





Dear Friends:

We made it to Jerusalem! That's the message from our Health Ministry Team. The Team challenged our congregation to walk to Jerusalem during Lent. And we did. We walked, swam, and did other forms of exercise and then recorded our "miles." And the total miles that all of us walked added

up to more than the distance from Westerville to Jerusalem, which is 7,850 miles. Yeah for us!

And yeah for Kim Hunt, who put in the time and effort to not only add up our miles and keep us posted on how far we had traveled, but she also provided us with weekly devotionals that turned our physical exercise into a spiritual experience as well. Thanks, Kim!

All this group effort got me thinking. What if we had a Bible Reading challenge? What if members of our church decided to read the Bible each day and then record the number of verses they read? I wonder if we could read the whole Bible before Pentecost? The headline could read, "First Presbyterian Reads the Entire Bible!"

There are 31,103 verses in the Bible (depending upon the translation). If 100 of us participate, and we each read ten verses a day, we'd easily read 31,103 verses by June 9, Pentecost. Ten verses is the average length of a typical Bible story, or about half the length of an average Psalm.

It wouldn't matter what you read, only that you read and record the number of verses. If you don't know where to start, I'd suggest Luke—one of my favorites. Reading the Psalms might also be a good place to start. Or you could start with Genesis—after all, the first words of the Bible are "In the beginning...." Or maybe you could start with a book of the Bible that is not familiar to you. An interesting one might the Book of Esther in the Old Testament.

Many in our church read the Bible regularly, and this would be a way to celebrate what they already do. But if you are not a regular Bible reader, I encourage you to take this month and a half and give it a try. Take ten minutes each day and read ten or more verses. Who knows, it might be fun! And it might just make you spiritually healthier as well.
