#### Reaching out to Refugees Sunday, January 19, 11:30 am

Our church has a long history of reaching out to others. As one example, during the Vietnam War, some of you helped establish a counseling service at our church. It is now Concord Counseling Center and employs 115 counseling professionals. Its website says it was founded in 1972 by "a group of concerned citizens with determination and vision." That's us!

Right now, it's difficult to hear about the obstacles facing people who, fleeing violence and persecution in their homelands, are attempting to immigrate to our nation. How would it feel to be separated from your children for years—with only a slight chance of seeing them again, without knowing where they are or who's taking care of them? That's even hard to imagine!

The refugee crisis seems overwhelming. So many people, so many needs. But do you remember the story about the starfish marooned on the beach? A man walking by sees a woman throwing the starfish back in the water, one by one. He asks what she is trying to do. Can't she see that there are thousands of dying starfish and only one of her? What difference can she make? But as she gently tosses another starfish into the water, she says, "I made a difference for that one!"

In the same way, we can make a difference to a refugee family—maybe only one family, but one for sure. An organization called CRIS, Community Refugee and Immigration Services, can provide the guidance we need. This group offers case management and core services to newly arriving refugee families from a range of cultures, languages, and countries. The team helps the

refugees meet their basic needs, connect to the appropriate services, and learn the skills that will support them in their new lives in our nation. In this photo, the 6-year-old son of a CRIS client is reunited with his family after being held overseas for three years.

Facing depleted staff and budgets, the CRIS team needs help. Can we provide it? Please come to an exploratory meeting on Sunday, January 19, in Fellowship Hall, right



after the service. A representative from CRIS will be here to explain ways that our church might help. It will be a working meeting, with goals set—and limitations noted. And we'll have lunch! Please sign up in the Gathering Place so we know how many of you to expect.

# Presbyterian Educational Event: PIE Saturday, January 11, 9:30 am to 3:00pm






### Westerville Martin Luther King Breakfast Monday, January 20, 7:30-9:30 a.m. at Villa Milano














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#### **Discovery Zone**

#### Sundays during the service

### **JESUS – Not Just for Christmas!**


I sometimes find myself laughing at the ironies of life when in the midst of them. One such case was when Christmas was over a few years ago, and I was putting away the decorations.

I especially enjoy having a nativity scene as part of Christmas, portraying the true meaning of Christmas. Years ago, I acquired a *Department 56* (a brand) collectible nativity set and several other pieces depicting ancient Bethlehem and Jerusalem. Each object and the tiny Mary, Joseph & Baby Jesus, shepherds, angels and wise men all are carefully protected with the accompanying building in separate styrofoam containers. Each of those is then put into a cardboard sleeve. I store the entire set in a large plastic box on wheels. It does take a little time to set this up, but it continually reminds me of the birth of Jesus all through the Christmas season.

Getting the pieces out of the large container each year is exciting as I prepare to set up the display. However, when it comes time to put the boxes back into the large storage container, I can't remember how I had previously arranged the smaller boxes inside. They vary in size so some maneuvering is necessary.

That year, I had all but one box back in the storage container, but it seemed to be just a bit too wide to fit, no matter what direction I turned it. I struggled over and over taking out and replacing boxes to get this one box in with the others. I *had* to pack these up. Christmas was over, and I couldn't have a lone box separated from the others where it could get broken. I noticed that the troublesome box was the one that contained Baby Jesus. <u>Jesus</u> refused to be packed up for the year!

That is when the irony of the situation made me laugh. Of course! Jesus isn't just for one short season! He isn't supposed to be 'put away' where he is forgotten. He is meant to be 'out in the world' always, not just at Christmas. That is what Christmas



is all about! During the coming Lenten season, we are reminded that the Baby Jesus grew up to save us from our sins and make us worthy before God. Jesus came for all us, and we live as Easter people, all year long!

# **Pastor's Page**

"Now after they had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, 'Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him."

- *Matthew 2:13* 

Dear Friends:

What happens after Christmas? For Christians today, it is coming home from our trips, saying goodbye to visiting family members, taking down the decorations, and in general getting back to our regular routines. For Mary, Joseph and Jesus, according to Matthew, after Jesus was born, an angel came and told Joseph that they were to flee their homeland and find refuge in a foreign land. And so, after Christmas, Jesus became a refugee.

We are well aware of the refugee problem in our country and in the world. People are on the move all over: whether they are fleeing war in the Middle East, famine in Africa, economic hardship in eastern Europe, or political oppression in Central America—people are moving to save their lives, to protect their families, to find a better life for their children. Just like Joseph and Mary and Jesus did two thousand years ago.

The Bible is full of stories of refugees on the move: From Adam and Eve forced from the Garden of Eden, to Abraham leaving his homeland to start a new life in Caanan, to Joseph sold into slavery in Egypt by his brothers, to the Hebrew people fleeing that same slavery across the Red Sea, to Jesus' family seeking protection in Egypt. The Bible is also full of instructions on how we should treat the foreigner in our midst. For example, in Deuteronomy we read these words:

"For the LORD your God is God of gods and Lord of lords, the great God, mighty and awesome, who shows no partiality and accepts no bribes. He defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and loves the foreigner residing among you, giving them food and clothing. And you are to love those who are foreigners, for you yourselves were foreigners in Egypt.

—Deuteronomy 10:17-19 (NIV)

The care and nurture of the foreigner, the refugee, is a commandment of our God, one we at First Presbyterian are preparing to live up to. On Sunday, January 19, our Outreach Committee has invited Tyler Reeve of Community Refugee and Immigration Services (CRIS) to explain how we can help welcome and support immigrant families in the Columbus area. It is a new challenge for us, but one that we are capable of meeting. I hope that you will come to hear what Tyler has to say and have lunch on January 19, and I hope that you will join in this life-giving ministry.
