# **First Presbyterian Worship Update**

Because of the high rates of infection in Franklin County, the Session voted not to hold in-person worship through at least the end of October. The Session considered several factors in its decision, including these:

- The current rate of infections in Franklin County is still unacceptably high;
- The results of our member survey indicate that most of our members are cautious about returning to in-person worship;
- The advice from the Presbytery, including its legal counsel, urges churches to wait to resume inperson worship until the infection rates go down;
- The Session also felt that it would be good to wait and evaluate the impact the reopening of the Ohio State University and other local colleges and the reopening of Westerville City Schools on the infection rates in the county.

Overall, the Session felt that our church needed to be cautious about resuming in-person worship, thus the decision to wait. The Session will continue to prepare for resuming in-person worship and will consider the issue again at its October meeting. In the meantime, we will work to improve our worship experiences for all our members.

**A Reminder:** We are continuing to livestream our worship service on our Facebook page at 10:15 a.m. every Sunday. An audio recording of the worship service is placed on our website shortly thereafter, and Rev. Gauen's sermon is sent in the daily emails on the following Tuesday. Please join us!

# **Pastor's Page**

"But ask the animals, and they will teach you, or the birds in the sky, and they will tell you;" - Job 12:7

Dear Friends:

Awhile back, I saw a picture on the internet of two coyotes walking down the street in front of Wrigley Field in Chicago. Wrigley Field in the middle of urban Chicago. Stores, restaurants, and apartment buildings surround Wrigley Field. There are no woods, forests, fields, or even parks nearby. And yet, the two coyotes were there, probably hunting for pigeons and rodents. (As an aside, the expert quoted in the accompanying article was an Ohio State University professor.)



Coyotes are fascinating animals. They are quick and cunning, and moreover they are one animal that can adapt quickly to changes in their environment. Whereas most animals have suffered under the changes brought about by human activity, the coyote has flourished. Animals such as the bear, the cougar, and the wolf have almost disappeared because of humans, while coyotes have increased in numbers. Where many species have gone extinct in the last hundred years, the coyote has expanded its numbers and its range. The coyote is the poster child for flexibility and versatility in the animal kingdom.

This got me to thinking. Maybe we need to be a "Coyote Church." This pandemic has changed the environment for churches so significantly that they are having to change to survive. I like to think that we are a "Coyote Church," one that can and will adapt to this new environment and be successful in doing so. What will we need to do to make these adaptations? That is what we are trying to figure out. What will have to change? Much of what we consider normal for our church will have to change in one way or another. I think that the coyote might be a model for us—we will need to have the same sort of flexibility that the coyote has. We will need the ability to adjust our thinking and our actions to meet the challenges caused by the pandemic. If we can do that, we will be a church that not only survives the pandemic, but thrives in this new environment. Just like the coyote!
