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Church Reopening Update

In considering when to reopen the church, the Session continues to be led by the Presbytery guidelines and by the desire to be faithful stewards of our church and our church members. With these guidelines and goals in mind, at its October meeting, the Session voted not to hold in-person worship at least through the end of 2020. This decision is essential because Franklin County is again coded red, based on an increase in COVID-19 infections. You may recall that the Presbytery guidelines recommend waiting to hold in-person services until the county where the church is located is coded yellow.

This decision also means that we will not be in our sanctuary for Christmas Eve. Again, safety was foremost in the minds of the elders when considering this issue. However, even if we were to hold a Christmas Eve worship service in our sanctuary, it would not be anything like we are used to on this special night. Right now, our Worship Committee is looking at ways we can make this Christmas season special in spite of the challenges we face. And Rev. Hicks is planning a virtual Christmas pageant. Not to be missed!

While we are not reopening our church for group worship activities, people are welcome to come to the sanctuary during the week for individual meditation. The sanctuary will be open from 9:00 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. Mondays through Wednesdays. All we ask is that you call ahead of time and schedule your visit with our church's administrative assistant, Olivia Hodorowski (614-882-3155).

Below is an excerpt from an article by Rev. Alex Shanks that speaks to what makes churches different than other organizations when it comes to resuming in-person worship.

"Why Reopening a Church is Different"

"Everywhere we turn, people are talking about reopening. Should churches simply follow the same guidelines regarding reopening as other institutions? I believe there are practical principles and theological reasons why reopening our church campuses requires a different kind of thinking. The church shouldn't be looking to sidestep the guidelines. The church shouldn't be simply reacting to what others are doing. The church should be leading the way by modeling a method of safety for others to follow.

"Churches need to open their campuses faithfully, not just safely. Churches will need to consider how the changes required to reopen safely could adversely impact the nature and integrity of worship and ministry. Our expressions of church need to reflect the values and essence of who God has called the church to be. Churches should ask: What are the essential worship elements that express who we are and who we believe God to be, and how can we ensure those are done authentically in this new model? Figuring out how to faithfully do ministry in a world of social distancing while maintaining virtual church options for those who can't attend in person, will require a new wave of ingenuity and adaptation. Some churches may choose to reopen their church campuses much later in order to open faithfully.

"Churches are built primarily on trust. People don't regularly attend a church where they don't trust their leaders to make healthy and informed decisions. If you lose the trust of your congregation during a reopening of your campus, you lose an essential glue that holds the organizational life together. One can only imagine the impact of losing the trust of the general public by being the next tragic headline. You may be concerned about people going to the church next door who is opening sooner than you are. In the long run, people will attend churches based on trust and a feeling of safety, rather than when they reopened."

Administrative Services Has Been Busy!

The Administrative Services Committee has been using this "downtime" to improve and beautify our church facilities. We're looking forward to the time when we're all back in the building together, but until then, we wanted to share the following projects with you.

First Presbyterian Is Going "Green"

We (FPC) are participating in an energy incentive program offered by Westerville's Electric Division. During our renovations in 2017/18, we earned an incentive rebate of approximately \$1,300 from the city for the energy upgrades that were incorporated into the new addition. We've now entered into a new phase of the energy incentive program and are upgrading our interior lighting from incandescent and fluorescent to LED.

Roger Pulley has been spearheading this effort and recently completed the LED upgrades in the sanctuary. Before being retrofitted, each of the four hanging chandeliers had 12 100-watt light bulbs for a total of 1,200 watts per fixture or 4,800 watts for just the four fixtures. These lights have been replaced with 48 15-watt LED bulbs – a reduction from 4,800 watts to 720 watts for a reduction of 85% in electrical usage.

In addition to the hanging light fixtures, Roger has also replaced 4 100-watt bulbs above the choir loft and 6 100-watt bulbs around the skylight (aka the "ring" lights"). In the process, Roger has standardized the type of LED bulb being used so that we don't need to inventory a variety of bulbs.

Roger has also rewired the FPC sign out front, and it is now equipped with LED bulbs. The new bulbs provide an even, glare-free illumination.





Painting

A team recently painted the galvanized-steel railings for the new steps at the east entrance to the church. Prep work (including a vinegar bath to treat the galvanized steel) was done by Jim Hines, the primer coat was completed by Roger Pulley and Brad Gamble, and the final coat was done by Brad and Debbie Gamble. Check it out when you come back to church.

Opportunities

As previously reported, Tom Eshelman recently coordinated the removal of our main entry doors, which were taken off-site and completely refinished. The doors had been showing a lot of wear and now look like new.

If anyone is looking for something to do – we have several small projects that can be done before winter. For example, we'd like to get a coat of paint on two sets of railings – one for the front steps and the other for the College Ave ramp leading down to Fellowship Hall. If anyone is interested, we have the paint and brushes – all we need is a painter(s). Please contact Jim Hines or anyone else on the AS Committee.

Pastor's Page

"And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn."– Luke 2:7

Dear Members and Friends of First Presbyterian Church:

We all recognize this passage from the Gospel of Luke-because we hear it every Christmas Eve. When I hear this verse, I think of every Christmas pageant that I have ever seen, where Mary and Joseph, dressed in bathrobes, go up to a similarly dressed innkeeper only to be turned away with a vigorous shake of the head. I've always wondered what the real Mary and the real Joseph must have felt when they were turned away at the inn those many centuries ago.

I find this aspect of the story particularly poignant now because this year there is, figuratively, no room at the inn. Or in our case, no room in the sanctuary. With COVID numbers spiking across the state and the nation and with the colder weather coming, the elders of the church realized that there was no way that we could safely resume our in-person worship in our sanctuary anytime soon. As much as we'd like to gather for worship services, have a potluck, or hear a concert, we can't safely do those things yet.

So, we are looking for ways to make this Advent and Christmas season (which begins on Nov. 29 this year) special, meaningful, and spirit-filled. We cannot have our regular kids' Christmas Pageant—but Heather and the CE team are putting together a Virtual Pageant. Similarly, we can't have the Habitat Progressive Concert this year, but the planners of that event are looking at having a virtual option as well. Lynn Meyer will also add to our music offerings for Advent by recording several pieces of Advent music, which we will post on our website. In addition, we are still planning to have our special holiday mission projects this year, including the Christmas Joy Offering and the Hats, Mittens and Socks Basket, where we collect those items for the Pike County clothing pantry.

We are also looking for new ideas for the holiday season. Perhaps you have an idea for a program, a mission, or a ministry that we could do despite, or maybe because of, the pandemic. If you have such an idea, send it on to me or to one of our elders. It just might become part of a new holiday tradition at our church! And even if we can't make it happen this year, your new idea might spark something for a future ministry of our church.

The Gospel of Luke goes on to tell us that even though Jesus was born in a stable, he was still the Savior, the Messiah. In fact, the manger would be the sign that this child was indeed special. What was bad news for Mary and Joseph, was the sign of good news for the world. Perhaps we can turn the bad news of this pandemic season into good news as well. Certainly, we still have the message of Good News-that "unto us is born a Savior." That is a message to ponder in our hearts-and to shout from the mountaintops.
