### Ash Wednesday Worship Wednesday, February 17 7:00 p.m. Livestream

Lent is the six-week period before Easter (April 4 this year) and traditionally has been a time of spiritual renewal and dedication within the life of the church. In the early days of the Church, the purpose of Lent was to prepare new Christians for baptism on Easter Sunday. Since we cannot meet in person, we will focus on baptism rather than ashes this year. Those who want to participate in this year's Ash Wednesday service are invited to log into the church's Facebook page on Wednesday, February 17, at 7:00 p.m. and have a bowl filled with water sitting near them as a reminder of their own baptism. If one is not baptized, the bowl of water can encourage one to consider baptism in the future.

This will be a different service from our usual applying of ashes, but like everything else during this pandemic, it will be a chance to explore another aspect of Lent in a unique way.

## 2021 *Per Capita* is \$37.75

Part of the glue that has held Presbyterians together for 287 years

Per capita is a set amount of money per member that congregations pay to the larger Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to share the administrative expenses of the General Assembly, Synod, and Presbytery. Congregations have been contributing per capita since 1734. This year our church will pay \$37.75 per member (per capita) because it is important to support our denomination and because it is the right thing to do. The 2021 per capita the same amount as last year.

If we are able, the Session encourages each of us to contribute the *per capita* amount for our own membership. Doing so allows the Session to use more of the church's financial resources for mission, programs, and operating expenses. To contribute the \$35.75 *per capita* amount for your membership, just write 'per capita' on your check.

## Westerville Habitat Partnership (WHP) Update

WHP is very happy to report the results of our 2020 Progressive Christmas Concert. While we cannot separate the December donations to Habitat from those given because of the concert, the results are remarkable. We received over \$8700! These results are about the same as for the 2019 concert, minus the money made at Soup for Shelter.

Each of the participating churches (Church of the Master, Church of the Messiah, Central College Presbyterian, Grace Lutheran, and First Presbyterian) provided a portion of this "Grassroots" concert. However,

## **Annual Meeting and Annual Report**

11:15 a.m. via Zoom

Due to the pandemic, we are going to hold the Annual Meeting for this year via Zoom. This is a new experience for us, and we are excited to try it. A link to the meeting will be sent by email to all members on Tuesday, February 23. If you do not receive this email, you may call the church office at 614-882-3155. On the 28<sup>th</sup>, members will use that link to log onto the Zoom meeting beginning at 11:00 a.m. We will seek to call the meeting to order at 11:15 a.m., although we may start later if there are technical difficulties. The meeting itself will include a review of the year past and plans for the year to come. The Annual Report is being assembled now and will be sent by email along with the meeting link.

Because this is a new venture for our church, we will hold a "Practice Meeting" on Sunday, February 21 at 11:15 a.m. A link for the practice meeting will be sent to church members on Tuesday, February 16. Anyone is welcome to log into the practice meeting. If you are unfamiliar with Zoom, this will give you a chance to see how it works. And by logging in, you will help us work through some of the kinks in running a large Zoom meeting.

## **Update on Demolition of the Annex/Garage**

The Administrative Services Committee and a group of hearty volunteers showed up on Saturday morning (Jan. 16) to help clean out the Annex and the garage. The volunteers included Marion Ackerman, Ken Bonvallet, Doug Dunlope, Tom Eshelman, Debbie and Brad Gamble, Kathy and Mark Gauen, Jim Hines, Roger Pulley, and John Robbins.

We started with a goal of trying to relocate, reuse, or recycle as much as possible and to send as little as possible to the landfill. To that end, we did the following:

- RELOCATE Anything the church could still use was moved back into the main building, and all of the tools, equipment, and surplus materials from the garage were moved into our temporary storage pod.
- RECYCLE As for the stuff the church no longer needed:
  - Marion Ackerman and Jim Hines made a run to the electronics recycling center on Westerville Road with old computers and electronics (no CRT style monitors accepted);
  - Brad and Debbie Gamble made a run to the electronics recycling center down on Nelson Road with the old CRT monitors;
  - Marion Ackerman took a load of cardboard to the recycling center in Sunbury;
  - Jim Hines hauled old fluorescent light bulbs to the Westerville Electric Division's offices on East Broadway.



RE-USE - Finally, thanks to Rob Rankin, the Furniture Bank of Columbus brought its big truck
to the church on Monday, Jan. 18, to pick up about three dozen child- and youth-sized chairs, a
number of tables, and other miscellaneous furniture.



We were successful in not sending much to the landfill!

#### **NEXT STEPS:**

- Jan 25 we plan to have the electrical service disconnected.
- Jan 27 we plan to pick up our demolition permit from the City
- Feb 1 (tentative) Altman, the company we contracted with, will start actual demolition

### **Putting God's Love into Action**

Lent is a great time of year to take stock of your blessings as we are reminded of what Jesus did and His sacrifice for us. This past year, we have learned to appreciate our homes and are reminded that many people do not have adequate housing. Last year Westerville Habitat asked you to donate based on the number of rooms, electrical outlets, and sinks in your home. This year we are asking you to prayerfully consider donating based on the square footage of your house.

The average home in America is 1525 – 2435 square feet and costs \$100 - \$200/ SQ FT to build. (Custom, luxury homes can be as much as \$200 to \$500 per square foot to build, with labor making up 40% of the cost.) The typical three-bedroom Habitat home is 1250 square feet and costs about \$80 per square feet to build. We would LOVE your pledge of \$1 per foot, we are looking for 5 cents, 2 cents, or 1 cent per square foot. Any amount is gratefully accepted.

The money can be donated any time during Lent. Make your check out to the Westerville Habitat Partnership OR to First Presbyterian with a memo line "Habitat." We have the potential to assist families to build strength, stability, and self-reliance as we build more homes like the one in the photo, which was built in Delaware County.

# Presbyterian will be the first woman to serve as U.S. House Chaplain

# Retired Rear Admiral Margaret Grun Kibben's service includes top chaplain in both Navy, Marine Corps

LOUISVILLE — Retired Rear Admiral Margaret Grun Kibben, a Presbyterian who served as chief of chaplains in the U.S. Navy and chaplain of the U.S. Marine Corps, was named Thursday by Speaker Nancy Pelosi as Chaplain of the U.S. House of Representatives.

According to a news release from Pelosi's office, Kibben is the first woman to be named House Chaplain in the 231-year history of the position. She succeeds Father Pat Conroy, who is retiring. Pelosi said Kibben's "integrity, experience and patriotism will serve the Congress and the country well as she ministers to the needs of Members."

Kibben entered active duty through the Navy's Theological Student Program. She holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Goucher College in Towson, Maryland; Master of Divinity and Doctor of Ministry degrees from Princeton Theological Seminary; and a Master's in National Security and Strategic Studies from the U.S. Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island.

In her final active duty assignment in the Navy, Kibben was the Navy's 26<sup>th</sup> Chief of Chaplains. Before that, she was the 18<sup>th</sup> Chaplain of the U.S. Marine Corps. She also served as the senior chaplain in Afghanistan.

Her assignments have included the U.S. Naval Academy and Fleet Chaplain of the U.S. Third Fleet as well as chaplain positions at Marine bases at Quantico, Virginia, and Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. Her personal awards include the Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit (two awards), Bronze Star, Meritorious Service Medal (three awards) and Navy Commendation Medal (three awards).

In 2018, she addressed the 223<sup>rd</sup> General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) on the day she celebrated her 35<sup>th</sup> anniversary as a Navy chaplain. Military chaplains, she told commissioners that day, serve not only people from diverse religious traditions but also have many people in their charge who have no religious background. "Many men and women we deal with have never darkened the door of a church, a mosque or a synagogue," she said.

Nevertheless, Kibben said, chaplains are called to "care for each soul in our command and our service." She said chaplains have a unique opportunity to provide a listening ear to military personnel in need. "We have access to every space, every place and every office where people serve, and can come alongside them."

Chaplains, she said, are expected to provide spiritual nurture for people of all ranks, including senior leadership. In addition to serving as a "moral compass" for senior officers, chaplains, she said, are the only people in whom they can confide when they feel lonely or afraid.

Kibben told commissioners that when young people leave their congregations to serve in the military, they can count on chaplains to help with their spiritual needs. She encouraged those present to suggest military chaplaincy as a vocational option for people who believe they are called to ministry.

"If there is any dissonance there, forgive me, but think about it very deeply," she said. "Christ calls us to serve the people who need it most."

I do not ask for improved memory, but for a growing humility and a lessening arrogance when my memory seems to clash with the memories of others. Teach me the glorious lesson that occasionally it is possible that I may be mistaken.

Keep me reasonably sweet—I do not want to be a saint—some of them are so hard to live with— but a sour old wo(man) is one of the crowning works of the devil. Give me the ability to see good things in unexpected places, and talents in unexpected people. And may I tell them so!

Make me thoughtful, but not moody; helpful, but not bossy. With my vast store of wisdom, it seems a pity not to use it all, but you know Lord, that I want a few friends at the end. Amen

# **Pastor's Page**

Dear Members and Friends of First Presbyterian Church:

"Have you gotten your vaccination shot yet?" That seems to be the question that I am hearing all the time now. Either that or its corollary: "Has your mother (or dad or another loved one) gotten her shot (or his shot) yet?" And

I am hearing of more and more of our members and my neighbors answering yes to that question. I know that the rollout of the vaccine has been slow, but it is happening, and with it comes a sense of relief and expectation. Maybe we are finally emerging from this dark night of the coronavirus.

And that is what it feels like to me, that we are emerging, like a bear emerging from hibernation, we are on the edge of leaving the den of our isolation and entering the world again. But as I consider the vaccinated future, I find myself asking, what will it be like? What will be the same? What will be different? What have we learned from this ordeal?

The Season of Lent begins soon (Feb. 17 is Ash Wednesday), and with it comes a time of spiritual focus and renewal. It seems to me that makes Lent is a good time to ponder the questions of our faith, and this year those questions are bound to the questions raised over this past year. Thus, during the Sundays of Lent, I will be preaching on the theme of "Emerging in Faith," and I will consider what we might have learned about God, ourselves, and our faith over this past year; and how that will help us as we begin to inhabit a post pandemic world.
