From the Session of First Presbyterian

As we enter the New Year we are still dealing with the pandemic, but with some new wrinkles. Because the pandemic and its effects are constantly changing, the Session of our church has been constantly monitoring the situation and adapting our policies and procedures so that we can best serve the physical, mental and spiritual needs of our congregation and our community.

We hope that we can continue with our in-person worship as long as we can do so safely. In order to keep our sanctuary worship safe for everyone, we are asking all of us to consider the well-being of our fellow in-person worshippers. We can do this several ways. First, if you are feeling even slightly unwell, worship at home. Whatever you might have, staying home will keep you from spreading it to others. Second, if you have been in a situation where you might have been exposed to Covid, worship from home. Consider this your gift to the church.

The third way to show kindness to your fellow worshippers is if you have not been vaccinated, worship from home. This, too, is your gift—not only to your friends at church, but to yourself. According to the CDC, it is people who are unvaccinated who make up 80% of those who are in our hospitals with Covid. If you are unvaccinated, share our worship from your living room. Or better yet, go get vaccinated!

While we are talking about the ways we can care for each other, we can demonstrate Christian love by continuing to wear masks, and by maintaining proper social distance. These simple steps are expressions of our love and concern for our friends at church. And if we avoid passing the virus to each other, we also avoid passing it to others in our families and our community. We do all these things because we are all part of the network of love and care that we weave for each other as the community of faith.

As the pandemic runs its course, the Session continues to seek guidance from the CDC, state health officials and the Presbytery and will do so into the coming year. If the pandemic situation warrants, the Session may require that we return to fully virtual worship and this decision may take effect with less than a week's notice. If the Session so decides, the congregation will be informed via our daily emails and via robocalls. Similarly, when it is acceptable to return to in-person worship, we will inform the congregation.

While we may need to suspend the in-person portion of our worship, we will not suspend our worship. We have learned over the past 20+ months that we can worship through a virtual mode as well as we can through an in-person mode. We have upgraded our equipment and we now have a trained team of videographers who can use that equipment so that all of us can have a meaningful worship experience at home as well as here in the sanctuary. If we do have to go to virtual only worship, it will not be the hardship that it used to be.

Eventually this pandemic will end, but until it does, we are learning what it means to bear one another's burdens, as Jesus showed us how to do.

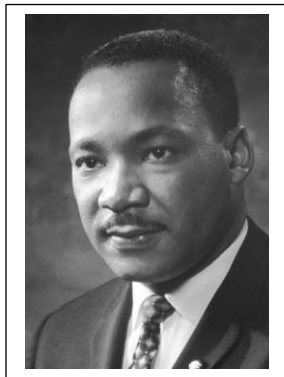
Presbyterian Educational Event

Awards are interesting, aren't they? When I was in high school, our yearbook staff gave out the traditional "Senior Superlative" awards.
