For many, the holiday season is not filled with happiness and celebration, but rather it is a time of sorrow and grief. This is a time of year when the loss of a loved one is particularly painful. To help those who find December to be a difficult time of year, First Presbyterian Church will host a Longest Night Service. This service will last about 30 minutes and fill focus on the message of hope, healing, and wholeness that Christ brings into the world. You can attend in person or via our livestream. Rev. Mary Jane Hitt and Rev. Mark Gauen will lead this service.

Habitat for Humanity Progressive Christmas Concert Friday, December 9, 7:00-9:15 pm

Don't miss the 13th Annual Progressive Christmas Concert, sponsored by Westerville Habitat Partnership! It will return in its original format on Friday, December 9, from 7 to 9:15 p.m. As before, guides will lead participants on a tour of three historic churches in the Westerville Uptown District - First Presbyterian Church, Church of the Master, and Church of the Messiah. Choirs will be



performing from these three churches, along with choirs from Grace Lutheran Church and Central College Presbyterian Church.

A Soup for Shelter event will precede the concert at the Otterbein Campus Center (100 Home St.) from 5 to 7 p.m. Soup, bread, cookie, beverage, and a handcrafted bowl will be provided for \$15/person. The bowls were created by students at Columbus Academy. The Soup for Shelter event will also benefit the Habitat Partnership. In addition this year, we will have a silent auction for two beautiful quilts, donated by the Fabrics of Faith Ministry of First Presbyterian Church.

Tickets are \$10/person (children are free) and can be purchased by contacting Bernie Simpkins, Diana Westfall, Sue Ann Norton, or John Cameron. You can also get tickets online at <u>www.westervillehabitatpartnership.org</u>. This is a walking tour, but transportation between churches will be provided if it is requested ahead of time.

Proceeds go toward Habitat for Humanity to build houses that are sold to qualifying families at a greatly reduced cost. The families help build their own houses and pay a mortgage that represents only materials, not labor.

Martin Luther King, Jr., Celebration Breakfast Monday, January 16, 7:30 a.m.



Did you know that Westerville has been helping to sponsor the Martin Luther King, Jr. breakfast event since 2006? It began as a way to honor Dr. King and his work and to open a forum for Westerville residents to converse about issues of racial inequality and the acceptance of diversity in Westerville. In this way, Westerville could continue the work of bringing our town closer to the ideals of Dr. King's "Beloved Community." Dr. King believed that when individuals collaborate in the pursuit of

equality, equity, and justice, society as a whole will become stronger.

This year, the 18th annual Westerville Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration Breakfast will be held on Monday, January 16, at Villa Milano, 1630 Schrock Rd. The doors open at 7:30 a.m., and the program starts at 8:00 a.m. Our Outreach and Missions Committee would like to increase the church's presence at this event and become a bigger part of these conversations. So our church will sponsor two tables at the breakfast, for a total of 16 spots. The church will cover part of the ticket fee, so that church members can purchase tickets for \$30. (This is also a fundraiser.)

The breakfast includes a panel discussion, awards for service, and interesting conversation. The theme this year is "The Dream (un)Realized: The Fight for Housing Equality." 

For example, the first people of African descent arrived here long before 1619; George Washington's troops were the most integrated American military unit until the Vietnam War; Presbyterians ordained the first man of color in 1800; there was a Montgomery-like

Remembering Janet Withers

Janet Withers died in October, 2022, at the age of 89. Janet was involved in many activities in the church and in the community, one of which was being a volunteer at Inniswood Metro Gardens. This year, the Columbus Metro Parks have been posting histories of all the Metro Parks on their website under the title "20 in 22." Back in July, they ran an article about the history of Inniswood Metro Gardens Park. Part of the history included the work that Janet Withers did to protect the park back in the 1990s. ROAD TROUBLE

The early 1990s presented Inniswood Metro Gardens with another threat, one that would imperil its hard-won status as a haven of beauty, peace and tranquility. The City of Westerville planned to extend Schrock Road through the northern edge of the gardens. The proposed 0.6-mile extension was claimed to be needed to cope with burgeoning traffic congestion in Westerville. A founding member of the Inniswood Volunteers, Janet Withers, became heavily involved with the public campaign to halt the road extension. "The gardens could have been ruined," she stated, if that campaign had failed. The Inniswood Volunteers, gardeners, horticulture lovers, and masses of concerned citizens, voiced their objections stridently at public debates and via letters to newspaper and media editors. They argued that the serenity of the gardens would be permanently shattered by the extension, and that woodlands and wildlife would be severely harmed or destroyed. A public vote finally decided against the extension, with Westerville voters rejecting the city's proposal in November 1994. Inniswood Metro Gardens was saved.

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This prayer on the next page was read at Janet's funeral by one of her daughters, Lynn Cameron. The daughters had found it among Janet's papers and wanted to share it with us. It might help explain why their mom was so generous with her time and talents.

Getting to Know You: Beth and David Wright



David and Beth both grew up in central Ohio, Beth in Columbus and David in Frazeysburg (an hour east) and were married in September 1985. Prior to that momentous date, Beth had graduated from Otterbein University and Ohio State University. David had graduated from Ohio State University and was in graduate school in the Exercise Physiology Department.

Once David finally got through all the work required for his doctorate, he headed off to U.S. Army basic training at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio as a captain in the Army Medical Department. This was the start of a 25-year Army career that included moves to nine Army posts. The first of those was at Carlisle Barracks in Carlisle, Pa. Our daughters, Shannon (1990) and Sasha (1992) were both born in Carlisle Hospital. Throughout all these years, Beth also served – Officer's Wives Clubs and Family Support Groups as well as Commander-in-Chief at home. She kept all of us in line, on time and on task. Just what a commander is supposed to do.

We moved to Columbus in February 2014, and David started working in one of OSU Wexner Medical Center's Physical Therapy Clinics in Hilliard, Ohio. We lived in Hilliard, close to work, until we found a house in Westerville. Three months after arriving in Hilliard, we celebrated Shannon's OSU graduation and less than two months after moving to Westerville, we celebrated Sasha's OSU graduation. We have lived in Westerville for nearly 8 years. This is the longest we have been in one place in 37 years as a family. As for the girls, Shannon is a professor in the Athletic Training Program at the University of Maine, and Sasha is in the film industry, working behind the camera in Los Angeles.

Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him." - John 1:9-10

We are entering the season of Advent, although for most of the country, and most of the world, this is the Christmas season. For most of the world, as soon as Thanksgiving is over, we enter the Christmas season—with all the appropriate decorations, and music and gift buying. And celebrations. It is a fun time, and yet, I suspect that most people don't know what it is we are celebrating.

Awhile back I was at home, and the television was tuned to a cooking show. The host cook on the show was doing a demonstration on preparing a meal for Christmas day. She went through all the things we associate with a Christmas meal—turkey, stuffing, mashed potatoes, and the rest. She also showed off her table decorations of pine cones and gold balls. It was just what you might expect on a home cooking show on TV. Then, as she was finishing up, the woman said something that caught my attention. She said that it was important to remember what Christmas is all about. I was wondering if she was going to talk about the birth of Jesus, but what she said was, "Remember, the real meaning of Christmas is the family dinner."

I won't argue that dinner with the family is an important part of Christmas. But the "real meaning of Christmas is the family dinner," Really? Something is definitely missing when Christmas is celebrated without Christ. I hope that for all of us, we find our "real meaning of Christmas" in the birth of the Savior. I hope that with all that goes on in this season, we hold onto the reality that God cared so much for us that God came to us and lived among us. He came not as a prince, but as a healer; not as a warrior, but a peacemaker. Jesus came into the world as an ordinary child, born in a forgotten corner of the planet, yet he came as someone who would change the whole world and the lives of every human being.

As you go through this holiday season, I hope that you enjoy and find meaning in your activities whether they be family dinners or children's Christmas pageants, or musical concerts, or finding that perfect gift—and I hope that you will find the real meaning of this season—that Christ came into the world to show us what real love and real meaning are all about.
