Celebrating Pastor Mark's 25th Years at Our Church



On Sunday, February 26, we celebrated the blessing of 25 years of support, care, and guidance from Pastor Mark Gauen. Installed as our pastor in February 1998, Pastor Mark is the second-longest serving pastor in our church's history. The longest-serving was our first pastor, arriving at First Presbyterian in 1829. And he served only 28 years!

As Elder Rob Rankin reminded us during the celebration, Pastor Mark has served in many important leadership roles in both our church and the Presbytery during those 25 years, not the least of which was his term as Moderator of our Presbytery. He also oversaw the major renovation of our church several years ago. That renovation continues today in areas such as kitchen remodeling, technology upgrades, and landscaping projects. And Pastor Mark has guided the church through the murky waters of the coronavirus pandemic, keeping the church as the center of our faith. His leadership has not gone unnoticed by the community. In fact, he was named Pastor of Uptown by the Westerville Neighbor to Neighbor organization. In the photo on the left, Elder Debbie Nealer-Bice has presented Pastor Mark with a plaque, officially renaming our lounge the Gauen Gathering Area. Well done, Pastor Mark, well done.

In the photo on the right, our amazing choir now looks as good as they sing. They are wearing handsome new robes—for the first time in 30 years. The robes were purchased with the Haning Memorial Fund. Bob Haning sang in the choir and would be proud of the new robes.

Communion Will Change on March 5



Among the many changes caused by the pandemic was the way we serve communion here at First Presbyterian. Since we resumed inperson worship, we have used "communion kits," prepackaged containers that hold both a wafer and a small cup of juice. Now that we are adjusting to the impact of Covid, the Session has decided to return to serving communion as we did in the pre-Covid days.

Beginning March 5, we will again serve communion by passing plates

of bread cubes and trays of juice-filled cups along the pews. For those who prefer to use the communion kits, they will still be available as you enter the sanctuary. As before, we will serve communion on the first Sunday of each month, with occasional exceptions, such as in April of this year, when we will serve communion on the second Sunday, which is Easter. Those who worship with us from home are still encouraged to prepare elements of juice and bread for their own use during the communion liturgy.

We do need people to help serve communion. In the Presbyterian Church, a person must be an ordained elder or deacon to serve communion. If that describes you, the Worship Committee invites you to offer to serve communion by contacting Diana Westfall or Marilyn Linkous.

Note from the Deacons: With the return of regular communion comes the need for help preparing it, as well as serving it. You don't need to be an elder or a deacon to prepare the elements. A sign-up sheet has been placed in the Gauen Gathering Area notebook for anyone willing to help with the preparation. Or you can contact Anne Bates. The deacons have also been serving home communion. If you would like to have communion served in your residence, please call Anne or the church office.

Elders and Deacons—What Do They Do?

In March, the Nominating Committee of our church begins its work of recruiting people to serve as Elders and Deacons—the servant leaders of our church. If someone from the Nominating Committee asks you to serve in one of these positions, please give it prayerful consideration, and if you feel so called, respond in the affirmative.

To help everyone understand the work of our officers, below is a summary of the responsibilities for both Ruling Elders and Deacons at First Presbyterian. (Ruling Elders are those Elders who are currently sitting on the Session. Once you are ordained as an Elder or a Deacon, you will always be one.)

Basic Duties of Ruling Elders at First Presbyterian Church

The primary responsibility of Ruling Elders at First Presbyterian Church is to provide spiritual and temporal leadership for the congregation through the work of the Session. The Session is responsible for the general welfare of the church: the ordering of worship, educating the congregation, managing our finances and property, supervising the staff, promoting mission and outreach, welcoming new members, providing for the care and nurture of the members, and participating in the work of the Presbytery, our governing body.

The following are duties required of Ruling Elders:

- Session Meetings: The Session meets once a month (not in July) and at other times as needed. Regular meetings are held on the second Monday of the month.
- Committee Assignments: Each Ruling Elder is assigned to chair or co-chair one or more committees of the church. Occasionally, an Elder is given a special assignment not attached to a standing committee of the church. Most committees meet on the first Monday of the month, but committees can and do set their own meeting times. Elders recruit members for their committees and lead them in their work on behalf of the church.
- Ruling Elders help develop how the church carries out the ministry of Jesus Christ through programs and policies and efficient use of the resources of money, time, and personnel.
- Ruling Elders are expected to cultivate their own relationship with Christ and use this relationship to help the Session discern God's will for the church.
- Ruling Elders contribute to the work of the Session through open and honest discussion of the issues facing the church.

Basic Duties of Deacons at First Presbyterian Church

The primary duty of Deacons is to care for the members of our church. Each Deacon has a list of 15 to 20 households that they watch over. The Deacon stays in touch with each of these households during the year and gives physical and spiritual support as needed. Most of a Deacon's work is done individually, in ways that suit the personality and the time constraints of each Deacon.

The Deacons also carry out some ministries as a group. Among the Deacons' corporate ministries are:

- Taking Communion to Shut-ins. Each time we serve communion, two of our Deacons take the elements of bread and juice to our members who cannot make it to the worship service. Many find this to be one of the most significant ministries of the Deacons.
- Helping Hands. The Deacons recruit members who are willing to help other members by giving them a ride, making a repair, or just keeping them company. The Deacons coordinate the compassion of our members with the needs of others.



- Funeral Support. When we have a funeral at our church, the Deacons help with greeting, ushering, and providing a reception after the event.
- Special Educational Events. From time to time, the Deacons sponsor special educational events for the congregation related to their ministry of caring.
- Blessing Box. The Deacons ensure that our Blessing Box is filled with appropriate items donated by church members.
- Picture Directory. Every few years, the Deacons organize the production of a photo directory of the church members.
- Deacon of the Month. Each month, a Deacon is assigned to be the Deacon of the Month. This Deacon handles the distribution of the sanctuary flowers after the service, gives the devotion at the Deacon meeting, and attends the Session meeting that month.

Speaking of the Session, the following votes were taken during its February 13 meeting:

- Feb. 26 baptism was approved for James Walter Kaste, son of Dan and Kate Kaste, both members of this congregation.
- Member Bev Etling was approved to use the building for a solo choral concert on June 3.
- The Finance and Stewardship Committee report for the month of January was approved.
- The Kitchen Task Force project was approved to move forward with an amendment to include funding sources.
 - Frank G. and Juanita L. Smith Fund: \$96,553
 - Haning Memorial Fund: \$99, 856
- Rev. Gauen's housing allowance, tax resolution, and terms of call were approved for presentation at the congregational annual meeting on Feb. 26.
- Member Lori Lampel was approved to serve as a member on the board of Resource Opportunities.

The needs of the people served by this box vary. We have found that anything that requires cooking is not appropriate. Even canned fruit and vegetables are not removed. Quite possibly, we are serving needy students and some homeless people.

Currently, we are well supplied, but as interest grows and the Farmers' Market returns, we will see more use. To donate to the Blessing Box, please bring canned protein – tuna, chicken, pasta with meat. Also popular are breakfast bars, bottled water, and all

toiletries (razors, shaving cream, shampoo, deodorant, toothbrushes, etc.). Nothing is wasted, as we donate any items not picked up to our Pike County ministry.

Our motto: "Take what you need; leave what you can."

Pastor's Page



Dear Friends:

When I was in middle school, my parents brought me to church almost every week, and every week I would go to the Middle School Sunday School Class where we would learn about the Bible, God, and faith. Or at least I think that is what we did. I don't really remember. What I do remember is that

the Middle School Sunday School Class met in the church kitchen. We all sat around a center work station on stools. It was the coolest place to have a class, and I loved it. Maybe I loved it because on many Sundays, when we were finishing up, men and women of the church would charge into the kitchen carrying armloads of food for a church luncheon or a church dinner that day. On some days when I arrived at class, a pot would be simmering on the stove, filling the kitchen with the best aroma. Is it any wonder that I was often trying to convince my parents to stay for the luncheon or to come back for the dinner! I'm not sure how much I learned in those classes, but what I did learn is that the church kitchen is where God is.

I think God can be found in most Presbyterian church kitchens. We all know that Presbyterians thrive on meals—food and fellowship are what bind Presbyterians together. And it is in the church kitchen where the glue that does that binding is formed. Whether it is used to keep potluck dishes warm or to prepare a five-course meal, the kitchen is where it all starts. The Bible tells us that whenever two are three are gathered, there God will be also, and I have found that to be true, especially in the church kitchen.

On February 27, work started on our kitchen remodeling project. It is a comprehensive project that will replace all the appliances, sinks, shelves, and cabinets—all will be upgraded so that we can better prepare meals and clean up after them. I want to thank our Kitchen Task Force, led by John McElhaney, for their work in making this happen. I also want to express my appreciation for the gifts of the Smith Family and Bob Haning that have provided the funds for this project. The remodeling project is expected to be finished in May, or maybe even sooner. When it is done, we'll celebrate the occasion with...a meal, of course!
