It's Time to Step Forward Together!

Who do we want to be when we grow up?

The Step Forward Task Force has been laying the groundwork for an answer to that question.

Beginning last fall, the task force has been meeting with all Session-led standing committees and the deacons to determine how our congregation and our procedures have changed since the pandemic began. What did we do differently as a result of the pandemic? Of those changes, which were useful to continue going forward and which have served their purpose and can now be abandoned? And if you haven't been involved in those conversations, here's your chance.

June 11 will bring about a Step Forward Together event immediately following the Sunday service. Kicking off with a meal, we then will break into small groups to talk amongst ourselves about what changes have impacted us and what changes we might like to see moving forward. A streaming event will also be held on Thursday, June 15, from 6 to 8 p.m. Anybody registering for the online event will have a pizza delivered to their home, so everybody who participates will get to enjoy a dinner together!

After the meetings, every member of our church family will receive a SurveyMonkey email survey. That way, each of us has at least two opportunities to voice our opinions about the changes. The SurveyMonkey tool will offer a chance to throw out ideas you may not be comfortable bringing up in a group setting.

The Step Forward Task Force will compile the information collected in a report to Session in the fall. Although the task force will make some recommendations to Session, it won't actually implement changes – implementation of ideas is beyond the scope of the task force and within the purview of Session.

Some long-term members who remember the Discover, Dream, Do initiative from 2009 have asked whether Step Forward is the same kind of exercise. It is not. Step Forward is operational in nature, not aspirational. But determining what functions work best for us may help us in the near future as we explore who we want to be going forward in the coming years.


Bags for the Bailey Bench

By recycling our plastic film waste, we can earn a bench for our church! The Outreach Committee is enthusiastic about a new effort to collect plastic bags to be recycled so our church can earn a new bench. This bench would replace the Bailey Memorial Bench that was lost during construction of the church addition.

We will be using the Nextrex® Company's plastic bag recycling program. In this program, a community organization earns a composite lumber bench (plastic bags are used to make the composite lumber) if they collect 500 pounds of plastic bags in a 6-month period.

The Lions Club uses the same program to earn benches for Westerville. You might have seen those nice black benches in Uptown Westerville. Our church's program won't replace the Lions Club program; it will run parallel to it.

In addition to plastic grocery bags, we can also recycle bubble wrap, plastic shipping envelopes, Ziploc bags, bread bags, etc. (see below approved items). **The plastic collection will start on May 1.** A bin for the recyclables will be inside the back door of the church (in the little alcove there.) So please start saving your plastic film waste, bring it to church to be recycled, and help our church earn a new bench to replace the Bailey Memorial Bench. 😊

Getting to Know You: Meet the McElhaney's



A native-born Californian, Ann was raised on east and west coast naval stations until her father retired from the US Navy and settled in Redlands, California, in the mid-1950s. She earned a BA in Elementary Education with a minor in math from San Diego State University and was teaching 3rd grade in San Bernardino when she met John at a singles function at the Norton AFB Officers Club.

John had grown up in Pennsylvania and graduated with a BS in Agricultural Economics from Penn State and his commission in the US Air Force. They were

married in 1967 and spent the next 24 years living at various locations throughout the United States and the world. Places they called home included RAF Lakenheath, England; Cheyenne, Wyoming, (where John earned his MBA); Riverside, California; Loring AFB, Maine; Bellevue, Nebraska, (where Ann earned her BS in Accounting); and Barksdale AFB, Louisiana. John also spent time in Vietnam and Iceland before he retired and they moved back to California to be near Ann's parents.

The McElhaney's have three children. The eldest, Leann, is a graphic designer living with her significant other of 25 years, Eddie, in Inglewood, California. Sean is a retired Air Force officer living with his wife Karie and children Gabriel and Kaela in Saint Johns, Florida. The youngest, Judy Mulligan and her husband Chuck, are both retired Air Force Master Sergeants living in Bellevue, Nebraska, where Chuck works in the VA Clinic and Judy works at the Offutt AFB Hospital.

Following the death of Ann's mother in 2009, John and Ann decided it was time to leave the hectic pace of California and move near some of John's family. In August 2009, they purchased their home in Westerville. After signing the closing papers, they were strolling through Uptown Westerville when they noticed the church bell tower behind City Hall and decided to investigate. They met Rev. Gauen that morning and were actually ushering before they were officially members of the church. John served six years as a Deacon and is currently the Elder chairing the Kitchen Task Force, while Ann served six years as an Elder.

The picture above depicts not only their enjoyment of time in the kitchen, but also two of their other favorite activities: travel and spending time with grandchildren. It was taken in Cozumel while on a Disney Cruise to the Caribbean with family. Ann has contributed numerous colorful quilts to the church as an active member of Fabrics of Faith since its inception and now devotes time to the church's Presbyterian 9 Patchers group. She also makes about 40-45 lap quilts annually for the Mount Carmel Hospice Veterans to Veterans program. John has spent his spare time as a member of American Legion Young-Budd Post 171's Honor Guard, providing Military Honors for deceased veterans. He served 4 years as Commander and is now a Trustee. When not busy there, he can be found with the Aladdin Shrine Legion of Honor.

Pastor's Page

Dear Friends:

As many of you know, my cousin, Susan Foertsch, died on March 31 of this year. She was 65 years old. Susan and I grew up together; our families got together often while we were growing up. After Susan graduated, she took a job with Homemakers Schools, where she traveled about the Midwest conducting cooking schools for national sponsors. I was living in Wisconsin at the time, and Susan and I would get together whenever she was in my vicinity. Later Susan took a new job in Chicago. Needing a roommate, my family put her together with my fiancé, Kathy, and the two of them roomed together in the Chicago suburbs for our engagement year. Susan was one of the bridesmaids for our wedding. Later, I had the privilege of conducting Susan's wedding, which was the first wedding ceremony I performed.

Susan and her husband moved around a lot after their marriage, finally ending up in the Atlanta area, where they raised their two children and were very active in their church. Kathy and I stayed in touch with Susan and her family through social media, but we never made it down to Atlanta to see her. On Saturday, April 15, I went to Atlanta to say goodbye to Susan, the first family member of my generation to pass away. As I grieve this loss, I am comforted by the kind words of many in this church, and by the fine people of Susan's church, who will surround her grieving husband and children with love and support.

As always, there are stories to share when one gathers for a funeral, and I would like to share one such story that was told about Susan.

Susan was diagnosed in late January with Stage 4 lung cancer that had metastasized into her bones and brain. The day she got the diagnosis she and her husband Steve went to see their pastor, who already knew that things weren't going well for Susan. Susan's first words when she entered her pastor's office were, "God is good." And her next words were, "I'm good." And with that beginning, Susan, Steve, and their pastor began to lay out her last months of life and her funeral service. She told her pastor that she wanted these last months of her life to be a testimony to the goodness of God. And she wanted her funeral to be the same way, not to be about her, but to be about the goodness of God.

Not all of us get to plan for our death so intentionally, but I do hope that I can meet death with such faith, and such grace. Susan, from what I heard and saw this weekend, you managed to do both. May God welcome you into that heavenly mansion.
