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## Uptown Westerville Inc. Installs Historic Marker

<u>Uptown Westerville Inc.</u>, (UWI) an economic development organization, has installed an historic marker in front of First Presbyterian.

The 37-plaque project was jointly sponsored by Uptown Westerville Inc. and the Westerville Historical Society and funded through a grant from the Columbus Foundation. Thirty-six of the plaques currently are installed. The 37th will be placed on the former Corbin's Saloon on West Main (across from Westerville Cleaners) whenever a plan for its repurposing comes to fruition.

The First Pres marker was in the second round of signs in the project. Round 2 began last fall, when UWI consulted us for input on the text, written by local historian Don Foster. The Uptown Westerville Historic District was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 2019, largely for the role of The Anti-Saloon League in Prohibition. First Pres is one of five historic churches in the mix.

The text of our sign reads: **First Presbyterian Church** The first sermon preached for Presbyterians in this area was held in 1812 in a log cabin where City Hall stands today. Eventually a building to serve the village of Westerville was desired, and the edifice pictured above was constructed here in 1864. It was razed and replaced by the present-day structure in 1913. The bell was saved, and the design of the tower housing it was carried over to the new church.

Historically, church members have taken active roles in local and national movements. Hannah Mayne, president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union local chapter, led an effort to ban the State Theatre from showing movies on Sunday. She was the first woman elected as an elder in the Columbus Presbytery. Named in her honor are a city park and a residence hall at Otterbein University. Agnes Meyer Driscoll joined the U.S. Navy in 1918 and was assigned the highest position



allowed for women, Chief Yeoman. A leading cryptanalyst, she was instrumental in breaking complex Japanese navy codes during World War II.

## **Session Accepts Step Forward Final Report**



The Step Forward Task Force presented its final report to Session on Sept. 11. The task force has spent the last year obtaining input from the congregation regarding all changes made in our operations as a result of the pandemic. Which changes should be kept and which should be left by the wayside?

Following its acceptance by Session, the report was emailed to all church members and friends on *The Advocate* distribution list. Hard copies are available in the Gauen Gathering Area. The task force used three methods to take the pulse of the

congregation. Beginning with interviews of the Board of Deacons and all Session standing committees, the task force then staged two congregational meetings in the Step Forward Together event. The first was an in-person potluck immediately following the service on June 11. It was followed by a virtual meeting later that week. Both Step Forward Together events included small breakout group discussions. The data collection concluded with an online survey.

The results of the fact finding will be a topic of discussion at the Session-Deacons joint retreat on Oct. 8. Potential paths forward will be considered by the appropriate Session committees. In summary, the recommendations/observations are as follows:

- We should continue streaming services and offering hybrid meeting options.
- Our sustainability as a congregation is threatened by a dwindling number of young families.
- Communication issues are clouding the organization of committees and volunteer opportunities, making it difficult for members to understand how to participate.
- Committee organizations and jurisdictions need to be clarified.
- We need to memorialize those jurisdictions and organization in a written set of responsibilities and job descriptions for every function in the church, including everything from one-person jobs to the Session's standing committees.
- Our outreach efforts need to return to more hands-on mission activities than simply sending money to various efforts. Those efforts should include a focus on local projects (but not be limited as such.)
- Our music program needs to return to the more robust mode of musical worship we had in the past.
- We are thirsty for more social interaction within our faith family and need to return to potlucks and other fun activities on a regular basis.
- We need to look for additional ways to engage each other in substantive Christian activities.

Step Forward Task Force members are Dorothy Driskell, Peg Duffy, Jen Henson, Gary Hinzman, Mary Lee Jones, Elizabeth Moes, and Sherri Monteith. The team is planning a quick question and answer session for anybody who wants to discuss the report. Although not currently scheduled, it will follow a Sunday morning service in October.

# A Message from Rev. Nice (Originally in the Presbytery's weekly newsletter)

Dear Friends,

What does it mean to "DO CHURCH"? In my humble opinion, doing church means showing up somewhere (even sitting on your couch watching a livestream). Doing church takes up around an hour or so (depending on where you go) per week.

What does it mean to "BE CHURCH"? I think that is what Jesus was trying to teach to people. To be the neighbor, to build upon what was



given to you as an investment, to go into the world and teach others what you have learned about Jesus in your own life.

Unfortunately, we have gotten a bit off track. We often think of doing church instead of being the church. In our world we gauge success by how many cars are in the parking lot (similar to butts in seats) and how many young people are seen entering the building. We measure our success against what the world sees as important, rather than what God has told us is important.

Do you remember Moses telling the Israelites that they were to share what they had learned with the future generations? Do you recall seeing the Jewish community passing along the words of their ancestors in their Passover liturgy? What are we passing along?

If your answer is "the right way to behave in church" or "the way the worship service is put together" or even "my favorite hymns"...I hate to tell you...but those things are killing our future congregations.

The young who we long to see in our churches are looking for authentic ways to live out our faith. They want to hear your testimony about where you have seen God at work, where you learned to trust God, how you have changed your life to follow a living God.

Being the church is being the neighbor, offering a generous hospitality to strangers and friends, acknowledging the God-image in every person, not just those you like. Being the church is how we show we are in the world but set apart from the world. How are you doing at BEING?

#### Getting to Know You: Liz Gauen

Hi, everyone! You may know me as Pastor Gauen's kid, but outside of church, I work as a Rehabilitation Engineer at the Ohio State Wexner Medical Center Assistive Technology Center. As a Rehabilitation Engineer, I work alongside physical, occupational, and speech therapists to create and adapt technologies for people with disabilities.




While my first exposure to wheelchairs was actually racing my grandfather's wheelchair down the hallways of their apartment complex, my interest in Rehab Engineering was piqued in college. During my senior year, I worked as a student manager for the University of Illinois wheelchair basketball team, where I learned a lot about disability culture and developed a passion for Rehab Engineering.

When I moved back to Columbus, I had no idea that the Ohio State Wexner Medical Center actually has one of the largest Assistive Technology Centers

in the country! Our clinic is unique because we have multiple services under one roof, including a wheelchair clinic, a driver rehabilitation program, an augmentative and alternative communication clinic, and a 'smart clinic,' where we help with phone, computer, and smart home access. We see around 50 patients per day--folks of all ages and all diagnoses.

My role is also unique - I'm one of only a few full time clinical rehabilitation engineers in the country. My days are always different; one day I might be programming a power wheelchair for someone to control with their eyes, another day I might be setting up a minivan for someone to drive with joysticks, and another day I might be helping someone use everything on their computer with just their voice. We even started an adaptive gaming program, where kids and adults play video games with adaptive controllers!



My favorite part of my job is helping people be more independent in doing the things that are important to them. My patients all have interesting stories to tell, and I like to be a piece of helping them get out and be able to tell those stories.

# **Pastor's Page**

This is a copy of the letter I sent to the congregation in September. I am reprinting it now for anyone who did not receive the letter earlier.

September 13, 2023

Dear Members and Friends of First Presbyterian:

I tried to think of some clever way to say this, even some philosophical way, but I can't. So instead, I'll come right out and say it: I am announcing my retirement from ministry at First Presbyterian Church. My last Sunday will be June 2, 2024.

As many of you know, Kathy is retiring from teaching at the end of this school year, so it seems fitting that I retire at the same time. We will explore the wonders of retirement together.

I am announcing my retirement now on the recommendation of our Presbytery Executive, Rev. Kathleen Nice, who told me normally retirement is announced six to nine months prior to the date. I chose the longer end of that window to allow this church to include my retirement in the plans for 2024. This lead time will also give the Session time to find a transitional, or interim, pastor to come and help this church move from my pastorate to new pastoral leadership.

It was 26 years ago this week that I came here to preach a sermon and to be voted on as the new pastor of First Presbyterian Church. It has been quite a ride since then. I have shared many special moments with you in this congregation, some joyful, some sad, some successful, some not so. But I have felt God's loving presence in all of them.

It has been a long time since this church has had to find a new pastor. During my remaining months here, I will try to educate the church on the Presbyterian process of transition. To that end, I have asked Rev. Nice to preach on Sunday, September 24. She will help us understand what needs to happen in these last months of my ministry here and in the months after I leave.

For the near term, Kathy and I plan to stay in our present house in Westerville—two grandsons make that an easy choice. So, you may see one or both of us in town. However, I will not be worshipping with you on Sunday mornings or attending any church functions after I retire. I also will not conduct any weddings or funerals. This is a rule of the Presbytery--and just good practice. This will allow a new pastor to establish himself or herself as your shepherd and guide.

When I came here, this church welcomed me as a pastor and I never felt like I was living with the ghost of my predecessor, Rev. Jane Mykrantz. I was helped by Jane in that she also adhered to this Presbytery policy. I want to give my successor the same gift that Jane gave me.

I hope that in these last months that we have together as pastor and congregation, we can enjoy each other's company, share fond memories, talk about what the future might bring, and continue to minister to each other and the community. And through it all, I hope that we can praise God for all the wonderful blessings we have. I know I will.
