Reluctantly, We Said Goodbye

When Rev. Mark Gauen preached his last sermon at our church on June 2, he was the second-longest serving pastor to lead this congregation. He retired after more than 26 years with us, so it was befitting that we sent him off with a bang. Some somber and meaningful moments were topped with a few comic touches (like a goldfish in Mark's water glass on the pulpit – just like on his first Sunday with us in 1998).

We didn't just say goodbye to Mark, though. We also will miss his wife Kathy, with her big smile and bigger heart. Fortunately, at least some of the Gauen "children" will remain in our church, contributing greatly to our programs with their compassion, dedication, and many skills.







Pastor Mark donated his stole to be preserved in our time capsule in a special retirement benediction conducted by Rev. Kathy Nice, acting head presbyter at the Presbytery of Scioto Valley. In the first photo below, Mark lays the stole on the communion table.

In the middle photo, Jim Hines displays the church's wooden plaque with the names of our previous pastors carved into it. The plaque has hung on our sanctuary walls for decades. Pastor Mark's name is now included, of course. The third photo below shows Rev. Nancy Dumford, our Interim Transitional Pastor, leading prayers during the service.







After the service, we presented Pastor Mark with a Wilderness Systems fishing kayak and trailer (and an empty cradle to hold Kathy's kayak) – the combined gift of many parishioners. The middle photo shows a surprised and delighted Mark and Kathy, seeing the new kayak for the first time. And we wound up the festivities with a delicious catered luncheon served to roughly 150 people, dining both indoors and out.

Thoughts on Transition

This pithy description of church pastoral transitions really captures the scope of the process:

Transition starts with an ending and finishes with a beginning.

The idea of transition first entered our congregation when Pastor Mark announced his decision to retire last fall. Since then, our church has achieved many milestones, including appointing two transition coordinators, hiring an interim pastor, celebrating our love and appreciation for Mark and Kathy Gauen in their fruitful 26+ years of ministry, and beginning anew with a different voice in the pulpit. Well done.

Recently, I shared with the leaders of the church that there are really three phases of a good transition. **Phase 1:** Leaving/Losing/Letting Go; **Phase 2:** The Neutral Zone; and **Phase 3:** A New Beginning. Each phase has unique work to be done, and each helps the congregation to lower anxiety, encourage good mental health, and prepare to receive a new pastor.

On a lighter note, I have a friend who is currently serving her fourth congregation in transition. She uses a scene from the movie "Shrek" to explain to her congregations what transition may feel like. "Pastor" Shrek is trying to get Donkey to cross a scary bridge, to complete the task they set out to do. I don't believe that I would be effective in emulating Shrek's style, but it is worth a quick look to identify the analogy to our situation.


Welcoming Visitors Is Everyone's Role

Created by Deacon Mary Lee Jones, these scrolls include a welcoming letter from First Presbyterian, a current edition of the *Advocate*, a Visitors Information card, and a First Pres pen, tied up with a bow. Visitors do appreciate receiving them.

Prayers at Twilight Sunday Evenings, August 4, 11, 18, 25 7:30-8:15 pm



This August, we will start a new prayer group on Sunday nights at 7:30 PM in the sanctuary. We will use the guidebook *Prayers at Twilight* to help us pray in a way that foster seeing all of life as a place to encounter God. With themes that include vocation, beauty, presence, conversation, hospitality, and wholeness, we will explore contemplative prayer together. No need to bring anything, just come and enjoy. The Blessing Box

The Blessing Box is located on the east side of the church building, facing State St., and serves as a small pantry. This is a deacon-sponsored project. "Take what you need; leave what you can" is the simple message. Those who leave items are blessed in giving. Those in need are blessed in receiving. This is a community project and an anonymous program.

Please consider donating to this meaningful mission to show God's love in a tangible way. The following lists the most needed items. Those highlighted are low in supply:

- Chicken and tuna packets or cans
- Other sources of protein: peanut butter, canned meat
- Crackers with cheese or peanut butter and breakfast or protein bars and snacks
- Other non-perishable foods, e.g. juice boxes, fruit cups
- Bottled water
- Toiletries including hand soap, shaving cream, razors, shampoo, toothbrushes and toothpaste, and deodorant
- Personal hygiene products
- Diaper and baby wipes, Laundry detergent
- Small cans or pouches of pet food

Items can be dropped off at the church throughout the week, including Sundays. Please place your donated items on the storage shelves under the rear entry stairs near the Pike County crates. If canned goods or other items are not selected, they are donated to Pike County. Nothing is wasted. Please consider donating. Thank you.

Have You Heard of the People's Fund?


The People's Fund was established long ago to provide temporary financial assistance to people in dire need. Its aim is to assist in alleviating a temporary financial crisis. If you or someone you know would benefit from the People's Fund, please contact our pastor.

The Stewardship and Finance Committee assists the Treasurer in year-end accounting for this fund, which comes from direct donations and loose offering in the offering plates. Currently, our fund has a strong balance and is available as a need arises.

Pike County Donations

Members of First Presbyterian have collected food and transported it the Pike Outreach Food Pantry in Waverly, Ohio, for 30 years, helping to feed people in one of the poorest counties in the state.

Sharon and John Davis have spearheaded this effort since the beginning, transporting food in their small car on many occasions. Over the years, other church members have gathered, loaded, and transported food alongside Sharon and John. At the present time, Bob Doherty transports food in a van that is generously provided by his employer. After we have gathered a vanload of food, about every 2-3 months, Bob makes the trip.



Summertime is very difficult for Pike County families. Children are not receiving breakfast and lunch in school every day, so food budgets are even tighter than during the rest of the year.

How can we help Pike County? Please bring non-perishable food to the church. Baskets at the rear entrance make it easy. Items that are always needed:

- * canned goods (vegetables, fruit, beans, tomatoes, soup)
- * canned meats, stew, fish
- * breakfast cereals
- * whole grain pasta
- * brown rice
- * peanut butter

An alternative to shopping and bringing groceries is to give money so the Food Pantry can purchase fresh produce and perishables. You can donate through the church (make a check out to First Presbyterian and write Pike County in the memo) or give directly to Pike Outreach: https://pikeoutreach.org/.

Farmers' Market Ministry






Also from Bev:
